Implant Recipient Perspective

Merle is a 20-year-old cochlear implant recipient with a unilateral hearing loss. She was diagnosed when she was 7 years old and progressively lost her hearing until she became a cochlear implant candidate. Merle finally decided to get a cochlear implant because she struggled to hear in various situations, especially noise. Here is our interview with her.



How does having a unilateral hearing loss affect your ability to hear at home or when you were in school?



Having a unilateral hearing loss affected my ability to hear immensely. It was extremely hard to grasp school lectures and lessons. It was very difficult to maintain conversations with my peers and family. I was missing out on all the jokes.



How would you describe what a cochlear implant is to a friend?



I would describe the cochlear implant as a magnetic device implanted in my head slightly above my ear with a processor that attaches to the outside of my head that helps me hear.



How did you feel before and after your surgery?



The night before surgery I was very excited and I couldn't sleep. Once it was time for the surgery, I became nervous. My Mom and aunt helped calm me down. When I got home, I felt extremely tired, loopy and very hungry.



What is one thing you are able hear now that made you emotional (laugh or cry)?



What made me laugh was hearing one of my favorite movies from beginning to end.



What was the silliest thing someone has ever said to you about your hearing loss?



People have said a lot of silly things about my hearing loss. The silliest thing that was said to me was "But, you don't look deaf!"



What situations were especially hard for you with a unilateral hearing loss? Have these situations become any better?



There were a lot of situations that were especially hard with my unilateral hearing loss. A lot of them were in school and hanging with my friends. In school it was group projects and listening to the lessons. With my friends it was (hard) keeping up with conversations. Now that I have my cochlear implant the situations have improved tremendously. I'm able to keep up with conversations and listen to lessons.
